#### Vicar's Viewpoint

Many of you will know the joy of discovering a church where the creaky door opens when the handle is turned and a musty sense of stillness and calm greets you as you tentatively step across the threshold. The English parish church is sometimes at its best when it is empty. And although we rejoice in a full church on Sundays, our quintessential parish church is perfectly suited to a time of quiet prayer and reflection for those who seek a moment of sanctuary during the week.

For this reason, the Parish Church Council took the bold decision last year to keep the church open every weekday between Morning Prayer at 9am and Evening Prayer at 5pm, taking care to lock away the valuable candlesticks and other easily removable items. Judging from the number of votive candles lit each day and the comments made to the vergers and myself, as well as those left in the visitor's book, this has been greatly appreciated.

Sadly, in May this year, someone let off a fire extinguisher in the church which contained a toxic powder. This necessitated a professional clean-up operation of the church building from top to bottom and the historic pipe organ. Thankfully, our insurers agreed to pay the considerable costs of all this.

The PCC, which have a duty of care for the church building, have therefore had to deliberate long and hard about whether to continue with an open-church policy. After careful consideration, and with the backing of our insurers, they have decided to persist with this policy, while taking as many sensible precautions as possible. Three reasons stand out:

- ◆ The conviction that the original decision was right and widely appreciated
- ◆ The belief that this was a one-off incident

by a mentally disturbed individual who hasn't been seen since

- ◆ The imperative for our words and deeds to be consistent with each other. We talk about the importance of gospel values such as openness, trust, hospitality, refuge, risk-taking and prayer. So we must ensure that our church building reflects these values.

However, we do need the help and vigilance of all local residents to guard against further disturbing incidents. We urge you simply to pop your head round the door each time you're passing, take a moment to enjoy the

PS: You may have noticed that the churchyard fence is in a state of disrepair. Since the churchyard has long been closed to new burials, the local council have a statutory responsibility to maintain the grounds. But we are conscious that a cared-for churchyard reflects a caring church. So we've been working hard with the council to clear the overgrown parts and they have already replaced the back fence. They are now ordering a replacement for the fence around the pavement. This will remain low, with open gates, since it is in no way intended to keep people out, but rather to demarcate a consecrated area that all may enjoy in peace.

### Choral Evensong

As a fitting way to mark the 400<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the King James Bible, Choral Evensong was the perfect choice. Over one hundred



people were in church to hear some of the much loved words of Isaiah and St Paul beautifully read, to sing the evening canticles and Psalm 27, to listen to the choir sing an anthem by Tallis, composed about fifty years even before the King James Bible was compiled, to pray the traditional Book of Common Prayer prayers and to be informed by a learned sermon from Dr Jonathan Williams, parishioner, British Museum curator, and Trustee of the King James Bible Trust.

Dr Williams recalled how the KJB project began in 1604, right here at Hampton Court, when King James I chose his scholars and set out his ambition to produce a new English translation of the Bible – one that would unite all Protestants, whatever their churchmanship, be free from sectarian bias and which would reflect more accurately the true meaning of the original ancient Hebrew, Greek and Aramaic languages in which the Bible was written. Even if one of the King's underlying motives was at least partly political, the resulting publication, in 1611, had, and continues to have, a profound and worldwide influence on

all English-speaking Christians. As a congregation we gave thanks for that, recognising also that it is a jewel worth cherishing even though, these days, there are numerous other "modern" translations available

The service was followed, in a sunlit churchyard, by a glass of wine and much friendly fellowship.
